American Revolution

David DeBaun

Second New York Regiment,
Orange County, New York Militia
1756-1820

David DeBaun was born in Schraalenburg (Bergenfield) in 1759 to Abraham DeBaun and Bridget Ackerman. About 1770 the family moved to Hempstead in New York. David served as a private in the Second Regiment of Hay's Militia, Captain Garret Ackerson's Company. He married Hannah Forshay, b. 1868, d. 1836. David died in New Hempstead, NY in 1820. He was tax officer of Hempstead in 1811 and 1812; supervisor of Haverstraw 1811-1814. An enclosed plot in the Upper Saddle River Cemetery is the resting place of his entire family.

David Thomas Eckerson

Second New York Regiment,
Orange County, New York Militia
1738-1811

David Thomas Eckerson, was born in Schraalenburgh (Bergenfield) in 1738. He married Angenetye Vanderbeek and they had a sons Thomas, Paul, Jon, David and Aurie and daughters Hannah, Mary and Angenetye. He is on the Revolutionary War rolls in Rockland County. Revolutionary War veteran Peter van Orden was an executor to his will.

Jacob Corneiliszen Eckerson

Private Second New York
Regiment, Orange County, New
York Militia 1742-1838

Jacob Corneiliszen Eckerson, was born to Cornelius Corneliszen Eckerson and Rachel Johannesen Blauvelt in 1742 in Tappan, NY, where his father Cornelius had purchased 300 acres in 1718. He married Leah Westervelt b. 1745. He died In Ramapo, Rockland County, NY in 1838. He is on the Revolutionary War rolls in 1778 as a private.

Thomas Eckerson

Private New Jersey Regiment
1745-1818

Thomas Eckerson, 1745-1818, was married to Cornelia Eckerson. They had children, Thomas Eckerson, Edward T. Eckerson, Maria Eckerson Crouter, and Jacob Eckerson. He is listed as a Private, New Jersey Regiment. He also served in the War of 1812.

Stephen Goetschius

1752-1837

Goetschius was not a soldier. He worked to raise money and supplies for the war effort and is recognized as a "Patriot" of the American Revolution.

Abraham G. Haring

Second Regiment, Orange County,
New York Militia, 1755-1832

Abraham G. Haring was born in 1755 in Tappan, Orange, NY to Garret J. Haring and Cornelia Lent. He married Elizabeth Blauvelt.

He died in 1832 in Hempstead, Rockland, NY. He served in the Revolutionary War 1775-1783, Coopers Regiment, NY Militia.

Adolphus Shuart

New Jersey Regiment 1764-1840

Adolphus Shuart served in Hay's Regiment, New York Militia. He was born in 1764 in Paramus to William Shuart and Catriena Van Deursen. He married Aaltje Catherine Eleanor Ackerman 1772-1853. In 1800 they were living in Montgomery, Orange County, NY. He died in Franklin Twp. in 1840.

John Tallman

Sergeant, Hay's Regiment of Militia,
Orange County, New York Militia
1751-1839

John Tallman was a Sergeant in Hays Regiment of Militia, Orange County, NY Militia, Company of Captain Hogenkamp, William Sickles, and Aurie Smith, and is listed on the Revolutionary War pension records. He was born in Tappan, the son of Jan Tallman and Helena Gerritse Blauvelt. He married Margrietje Forseur (Forshay). He died in New Hempstead, NY in 1839.

John A. Terhune

Private, New Jersey Regiment
1753-1805

John A. Terhune, 1753-1805, was the son of Albert A. Terhune and Elizabeth Doremus. He inherited the stone house on the sw corner of Lake Street and West Saddle River Road, known as the Terhune-Hopper house. He married Catherine Lutkins, daughter of Harman Lutkins of Paramus. He is on the SAR list.

Civil War

Garret Ackerman

Union Army 1832-1914

Responding to his country's call, Garret Ackerman, age 30, voluntarily enlisted to serve in the Union army in the 22nd Regiment, Company D, New Jersey Infantry, a unit made up of men from Bergen County. Like many of the Bergen County men that made up the Twenty-second Regiment, Garret Ackerman was a farmer. He lived just south of Sawmill Road in Saddle River, on the left side, with his wife Rachel Terhune and children. His house is still there. On September 22, 1862, Ackerman was mustered into the Twenty-second Regiment of the New Jersey Infantry, Company D for nine months of duty. The most important engagement of the Regiment occurred on May 2nd and 3rd, 1863, when it joined the Army of the Potomac and fought in the Battle of Chancellorsville. One officer and 40 enlisted men died during service from disease. The Regiment was mustered out at Trenton, June 25, 1863, after nine months of service.

Garret's wife, Rachel, who grew up on West Saddle River Road just south of Lake Street. They wrote letters to each other, exchanging news and advice and hopes for the future. She wrote about the farm, the Old Stone Church and the Rev. Manley and news of people at home along with her concern for him. Garret wrote to her

about camp life and what he would like her to send him and gave her advice on planting and farm matters.

John Marks

Co. F 10th New Jersey Infantry
Regiment, Union Army 1888

David May

Private, Co. H, One Hundred and Forty
-second Infantry; transferred to Co. H,
June 7, 1865; mustered out with
company, July 19, 1865, at Raleigh,
N.C. 1846-1915

Priv. May enlisted one month before the Confederate surrender at Appomattox, and two and a half months before the surrender in Texas. He fought in no battles and served during the occupation of Raleigh, N.C., the State capitol, until the 169th N.Y. mustered out of the service in July 1865. David was one of the replacements for the men lost in the battle of Fort Fisher, N.C., January 13-15, 1865, and the magazine explosion at the fort on the 16th. There was a very real chance the regiment would have been sent to fight in Texas, but the surrender in Texas precluded that possibility.

George Ritzhaupt

Co. B 74th New York Volunteer Infantry
Regiment, Excelsior Brigade, Union
Army 1827-1897

Philip Lee Wilson

5th New York Volunteer Infantry
Regiment (aka Duryee's Zouaves led
by Colonel Abram Duryee), Union
Army and Veteran Reserve Corps
1840-1905

Philip Lee Wilson was a successful lawyer, born in 1840 in the Bronx. His grandfather, Richard Riker, was the first District Attorney of New York. His great-grandfather, Peter Wilson (1746-1825), was a friend of The Rev. John Henry Goetschius, the noted evangelical leader during the religious turmoil just before the Revolutionary War. Two of John Henry's sons, Stephen [The Rev. Stephen J. Goetschius] and Peter, attended Peter Wilson's Academy in Hackensack, NJ. Peter Wilson was a well-known scholar, served on the Patriot side during the Revolution, and became a NJ Assemblyman, and a classical teacher and interim president of Kings College (Columbia University).

Like his ancestors, Philip was well educated and received his law degree from Columbia in 1860. He enlisted in the Civil War and served with Abram Duryee's Fifth New York Volunteer Infantry, known as Duryee's Zouaves, one of the first units to arrive in 1861 at Fort Monroe in Virginia after the fall of Fort Sumter. Duryee's Zouaves was one of the most famous of the Civil War units, mostly for their colorful and flamboyant uniforms, which featured baggy red calico pants and white turbans under which they wore a red fez, captured in a painting by Winslow Homer that is shown on the back. He was wounded, and ended the war as a 2nd Lieutenant and served in the Veteran Reserve Corps.

Like many New Yorkers at the turn of the 20th Century, Philip built a summer home in Bergen County. It was on East Saddle River Road on the east side, just before Locust Lane. Philip Lee Wilson died in 1905 and was buried with his son and brother-in-law in the Old Stone Church Cemetery along with his wife, a son, and a brother-in-law.

The Philip Wilson house built about 1900. Claire K. Tholl wrote in the Bergen County Historic Sites Survey that the Philip P. Wilson house has a place in Upper Saddle River's developmental history as it represents the type of large country house built by city dwellers in the Saddle River Valley at the turn of the century and is the only one remaining in Upper Saddle River.

When Arthur Raymond Reynolds was born on October 2, 1888, in Newark (Harrison), New Jersey, his father, Joel Sherwood Reynolds, was 35 and his mother, Elizabeth (Low) Reynolds, was 29. He had six brothers and one sister. He died on February 4, 1953, in Upper Saddle River, New Jersey, at the age of 64. From his birth, until sometime between the New Jersey 1915 census and the 1920 Federal Census, 712 North 5th Street, Harrison, New

Jersey was his home. By the 1920 Federal census the family had moved to Hillside Ave in Upper Saddle River New Jersey. Arthur enlisted in the Army March 15, 1918 and served until February 10, 1919. During his World War I service, he was stationed with the Army 63rd, Co. 16 Battalion, Depot Brigade. From information passed down, he was stationed in Florida, involved in the production of airplane propellers for the war effort. Arthur was awarded 4 medals for his service: The Great War For Civilization; New Jersey Service; New Jersey Victory; Citizens of Harrison, New Jersey For Patriotic Service. He remained single though out his life. From census information in his civilian life, he was working as a carpenter. He served as best man at the wedding of his niece Margaret Edith Reynolds in 1944. The Robert D. Reynolds elementary school, in Upper Saddle River, is named for his youngest brother.

Charles J. Backman was born in Paterson, the son of Joseph Backman and his wife Jennie. He was raised in Saddle River. Charles was an Army veteran of World War II, reaching the rank of Master Sergeant. He served in the Pacific Theater, and was the recipient of the Bronze Star, representing heroism, outstanding achievement, and meritorious service.

Charles married the former Muriel Hopper in 1931. They resided in Upper Saddle River and later were longtime residents of Ramsey. In his early life, Charles delivered milk for a local dairy. He later worked for Leonard King TV Repair.

Earl Emil Baer

Private First Class, Army, 155th
Infantry Regiment, 31st Division,
Served 1943 – 1945, Pacific Theater
1924-2017

Mr. Baer was born on August 28th, 1924, in Fairview, NJ to his parents, Emil and Grace Baer. He was a graduate of Dumont High School, earned a B.S. Degree in Civil Engineering from New York University and worked as a Structural Engineer in New York City and New Jersey.

As a veteran of WWII, he served honorably in the 155th Infantry Regiment, 31st Division, stationed in New Guinea, Mindanao, and Mariana Islands.

He married Mary Christine McIlroy of Ridgewood, NJ in 1948, raised his Family in Upper Saddle River, NJ and enjoyed 68 years of marriage. He is survived by his sons, Lawrence and Curtis, daughter Janet, 5 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.

Born on October 8th 1919 in Spokane, Washington. In 1942 he received a degree in electrical engineering from Washington State University. At that time the Navy commissioned him an ensign. After some time of study at Harvard and MIT, he became a radar officer stationed on the aircraft carrier, the Intrepid. In the South Pacific the ship was hit by two Japanese kamikaze planes minutes apart causing great damage. While stationed on the Intrepid, Paul earned a Bronze Star. He was offered a commission in the regular Navy, but after the war he elected to enter business and became a consultant in the new television industry in Washington, D.C., where he met and married Mary, a Congressional employee from Oklahoma. For eighteen years he worked for RCA (Radio Corporation of America) concluding his employment as engineering manager for development of a portable photo journalism camera. He then accepted the position of President of North American Philips. After retirement at 65 Paul enjoyed 31 happy years of retirement in Upper Saddle River with his wife Mary. Their three children Beth, Bruce, and Barry were fortunate to grow up in this pleasant small town.

Harvey S. Bower

Captain Army Air Forces 1919-2008

Beloved husband of Gladys McGuire Bower. Devoted father of two children and five step children. He was predeceased by his first wife LouJane (nee Carmain). Mr. Bower graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1940. He worked 40 years at General Foods as an industrial engineer. A WWII Army Air Corps. Veteran, he was Captain of the 332nd Bomber Squadron from 1942-45 in Great Britain during the air offensive in Europe. He received the European -African-Middle Eastern ribbon with six battle stars and the presidential citation with one oak leaf cluster.

Richard A. Brunn

Corporal Army 1919-2017 Purple Heart

Born on September 9, 1919 in New York City, Richard grew up in Manhattan and attended Allen Stephenson School in Manhattan, Trinity Pauling School in Pauling, NY, Augusta Military Academy in Virginia and Washington and Lee University in Virginia. He served honorably in the US Army, was wounded and received The Purple Heart along with other combat medals in the WWII battle of The North Apennines in Italy. He was a fourth generation member of the New York Athletic Club and served as Treasurer and founded the club Endowment Fund. His great Love was playing Snooker and helped cofound the International Snooker League which conducted tournaments all over the world. In retirement he travelled extensively around the world on the Queen Elizabeth 2 with his wife.

Louis J. Cavallero

Private First Class 3rd Battalion 381st
Infantry Regiment, Army 1923-2020

Mr. Cavallero was a Radio Operator. He received the Asiatic-Pacific Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, and World War II Victory Medal. Louis was a native New Yorker and he was fluent in Italian. After serving in the Army in WWII, Lou had a career as a tile setter until he retired and moved to Florida.

Charles Robert "Bud" Cheney Private First Class, Army
1936-2018

Raised in Harrington Park, NJ by Charles and Florence Cheney (nee Schaefer). Devoted husband to Catherine (nee Turcic) who together raised their 5 children in Upper Saddle River, NJ. Bud attended Dumont High School where he was Captain of the football team, All County Honorable Mention; 2nd Team All County, 1st Team All B.C.S.L. as a halfback. After graduating Dumont High School Bud served in the US Army as Private First Class and was stationed in Hawaii for two years, following that he attended Fairleigh Dickinson University. Bud enjoyed and excelled at a variety of careers including construction, truck driving, and eventually finding his true passion in picture framing and sign carving. His hand carved and gilded signs can be seen all over Bergen County including the Upper Saddle River police department, ambulance corps, library and the Hopper Goetschius Museum to name just a few. Bud not only enjoyed watching his grandchildren at their various sporting events he also enjoyed playing hockey into his late 70's.

Herbert Edgar Cocks Staff Sergeant Army Air Forces;
Served 1943-1945; Air Medal
Award; 1925-2019

Herbert Edgar Cocks was born in the Bronx in 1925 to Herbert and Rose Cocks. At the age of 17, he enlisted in the Army and became a Ball Turret Gunner on a B-17 in the United States Army Air Corp in the 8th Air Force and the 390th Bomb Group. He successfully completed 36 missions, defeating the Nazis and bringing peace to the European Theatre. After leaving the war, he became a builder and land developer in Rockland County, New York. Bert was preceded in death by his two wives Carmen and Edwyna and by his two sons George and Bruce. Bert is survived by his four sons. He is also survived by his 9 Grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

David Lloyd Gates Army 1927-2006

Of Airmont, NY, beloved husband of Frieda Simone Gates. Loving father of 3 children. David was a US Army Veteran serving in WWII. He was a College Professor Emeritus at the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, NY. David was the author of four college text books.

J. Dalton Goetschius 2nd Lieutenant 34 Army Air Forces
Bomb Group 1922-1944

The Rev. Stephen Goetschius' older brother, John Mauritiu, who lived in what is now Bergenfield, demonstrated his commitment to the new nation by joining the New Jersey militia early in 1775 and being appointed the rank of Major. John Mauretius Goetschius' defense of Bergen County and the surrounding area is recounted by Adrian Leiby and Professor William Marina, who describe John's skill as a guerilla tactician and leader of men as unsurpassed. He corresponded with General Washington's headquarters to coordinate actions between the Continental Army and the militia. He worked with other military and militia leaders to keep the soldiers fed and supplied. He and his men defended Dobbs Ferry above New York City when Washington moved his army north and west. And in May 1781, Goetschius and the militia drove Loyalist forces out of old Fort Lee on the western banks of the Hudson River at what is now the New Jersey side of the George Washington Bridge. More than a century later, John's second great-grandson, Dalton McPherson Goetschius and his wife, Jessie Barkley, had nine children, including six sons. He too lived in the Bergenfield area. All six of the boys served in the U.S. military during World War Two. Two joined the Navy, two joined the Army, and two served in the newly formed Army Air Forces. On October 19, 1944, 2LT J. Dalton, the second youngest of the brothers, was flying with the 391st Bomb Squadron on his 32nd mission of the war. Months earlier, that unit had helped prepare for the invasion of Normandy by bombing airfields in France and Germany and then, supported the landing on June 6th by attacking coastal defenses and communications facilities.

On the day of his 32nd mission, J. Dalton and nine other men were flying in a bomber formation over Mannheim, Germany when their plane received a direct hit from flak in their #2 engine and the wing tank on the left side of the aircraft, starting a fire. The plane peeled left from the formation and appeared to remain under control until it fell below the clouds 2,000 feet below the other bombers. One man bailed out, but his parachute was not seen to open before he entered the clouds. The crew was initially declared missing in action, but later it was determined that one man was captured and held as a prisoner of war while the other nine men were killed, including J. Dalton. He had just turned 22 years old less than two weeks before.

Richard Z. Goetschius Radioman Petty Officer 2nd Class
Navy 1925-1987

Robert B. Goetschius Private First Class Battery A70 Field Artillery Battalion Army 1913-1957

Died in Veterans' Hospital.

Leon Goldstein Aviation Radioman 2nd Class Navy 1924-1992

He was a resident of Upper Saddle River for approximately thirty years. Leon enlisted in the US Navy soon after the attack on Pearl Harbor and served for over four years until the end of the war. He served in the North Atlantic and Mediterranean theaters of operations. Among other notable actions, Leon's ship was involved in the invasion at Anzio in January 1944. The assignment was to provide armed coverage for the landing of troops, and off-loading of material and munitions from 21 ships, while under heavy fire. Leon received US Navy commendations for his actions, remaining at his station under heavy enemy bombardment.

Following the surrender of Germany, he was assigned to a new cruiser, the USS Huntington, preparing to depart for action in the Pacific—which was precluded by the surrender of Japan. When Leon was ready for discharge, his commanding officer recommended him for training as a naval aviator. He chose to return to civilian life to be with his growing family. He and his wife Ethel had four children.

George Greene, Jr. Corporal Army Air Forces 1908-2001
Roy Hagan Army 1927-2014

Born in 1927 in Brooklyn to Ellen and Arvid Hagen, Roy's first language was Norwegian. At the age of 18, Roy joined the Army and was stationed in Germany shortly after Germany surrendered. Roy was called upon when the US Army needed someone who spoke Norwegian. Norwegian ships were bringing food into Germany after the war, but with passions still running high over Germany's invasion of Norway, some Norwegian sailors would disembark at night and beat or kill Germans. Roy's job was to go on board the Norwegian vessels; befriend and talk up the German sailors; and then report which Norwegian sailors needed to remain on board. Roy helped to maintain peace in a place where the war had just ended. After leaving the service, Roy returned to the US where he met and married Rita Mazzochi. In 1955, Roy entered the State Department and he and his family were posted to Italy for two years. In 1959, he and his family moved to Upper Saddle River. Roy became a developer and for many years built custom homes throughout the area. He eventually became the building inspector for several towns in Bergen County. Roy was a long-time member of the Lion's Club and also served on the school board. He served in several ministries of the Presentation Catholic Church. He and his wife raised four children.

Andrew Lloyd Hopper Sergeant Army Air Forces 1923-1974
Andrew Lloyd Hopper (Lloyd) was born and raised in Upper Saddle River and was the son of John J. and his wife, Kathryn. The Hopper

family were one of the original families to settle in the area and were all life time members of the Old Stone Church.

Lloyd was an Army veteran, serving his country during World War II. His contribution to the war effort involved being part of the team that repaired and refurbished the planes and other essential war time equipment. Lloyd spent his time on several different bases throughout the US and while stationed at Douglas Air Force Base in North Carolina, he met the love of his life! Anne worked there on the base, contributing to the war effort. They married and moved to Upper Saddle River in 1946 to live near his family and raise their children.

Lloyd and his brother, John (Bud) founded Hopper Brothers Builders, their life's work, becoming master builders in the process. Lloyd was a dedicated member of the Upper Saddle River Volunteer Fire Department, serving over the years in a variety of capacities including Chief, President of the Department's Relief Association and Chairman of its Building and Grounds Commission. He held the last two offices at the time of his unfortunate death in 1974.

John W. Hopper, Sr. Corporal Army Air Forces 1921-2015

John W. Hopper was born in Upper Saddle River to John Jacob Hopper and Kathryn Beutel. He was descended from John A. Hopper, the original settler in Upper Saddle River, who lived in the sandstone house now known as the Hopper-Goetschius House Museum. John's father, John Jacob Hopper, was born in the Nicausie Hopper stone house on Hopper Farm Road.

John was an Army Air Corps veteran of World War II, serving in the European Theatre. He received a Good Conduct Medal, the American Campaign Medal, the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, and the World War II Victory Medal.

On returning home, John and his brother Lloyd founded Hopper Bros. Builders. Following Lloyd's death, John retired from building and worked for the Borough of Upper Saddle River, serving as Construction Official, Building Subcode Official, Fire Subcode Official, Zoning Enforcement Official, and Director of Public Works. He was an Ex-Chief of the USR Fire Department, and Exempt Fireman, a member of the American Legion, and a lifetime member of the Saddle River Reformed Church. He also served as a volunteer advisor to the USR Historical Society, sharing his knowledge of construction and local history as the Society worked on the restoration of the museum's buildings.

John was married to Doris Fischer for 61 years, living in Upper Saddle River and then retiring to Beachwood, NJ. As a widower, he lived in Ramsey, NJ and Goshen, NY. John and Doris had two sons, Alan C. and John W. Jr.

Reginald L. Hopper Technical Sergeant 346 Harbor Craft Company Army Transportation Corps 1911-1961

Reginald L. Hopper was born in Spring Valley, NY and was raised in Upper Saddle River. He was the son of John J. Hopper and his wife, Kathryn. Reginald was an Army veteran of World War II, serving in the Pacific Theater, reaching the rank of Tech Sergeant. He served his country in the South Pacific directing the sailing, docking, loading and unloading of a small boat. In recognition of his service, he was awarded three battle stars.

After the war, Reginald pursued a career with the Dundee Mills Corporation, New York City, where he served as Sales Manager. He married the former Valerie Olsen in 1939, and they were longtime residents of Brooklyn, NY.

Cornelia Bertha "Connie" Hubach Sergeant Marine Corps
1918-2016

A proud Marine, she served from 1943 to 1946. She was born in the town of Ramapo, NY, grew up and married in Monsey, NY. One of her first jobs was a real estate agent. In her 20s she bought a county-wide newspaper delivery business. She worked for Lederle Laboratories in the pre-computer age payroll department. Esko John Koskinen Private First Class Army Artillery Unit
Cannoneer 1924-2015

Esko J. Koskinen* was a First Class Private in the 28th Infantry, 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team, 229 Field Artillery Battalion as a cannoneer (Howitzer cannon). His regiment fought in the Ardennes Offensive, also known as The Battle of the Bulge. When the war was over and Esko was back in the United States, he received a Citation of Battle Honors from the War Department of the United States Chief of Staff Dwight D. Eisenhower. This citation details what it was like fighting at the front line:

For extraordinary heroism, efficiency, and achievement in action against the enemy during the Battle of the Ardennes.....On December 16, 1944, the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team..... was holding six and one half miles of the front line sector assigned to the 28th Infantry Division. During the period 16 to 18 December, 1944, despite repeated enemy infantry and tank attacks involving the elements of nine enemy divisions, the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team held its ground..... All elements of the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team were involved in this action. The 229th Field Artillery Battalion was engaged in direct fire on the enemy at a range of 150 yards. The Cannon Company of the 112th Infantry Regiment and Company C, 630th Tank Destroyer Battalion, by direct fire, succeeded in disabling 18 enemy tanks..... On the night of 17-18 December 1944 under orders from higher headquarters, the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team was withdrawn to the high ground west of the Our River. This withdrawal was accomplished successfully in spite of strong enemy infiltrations throughout the entire sector. From 18-23 December 1944, the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team was continually engaged in rear guard action covering the withdrawal of the right flank of the First American Army. On the night of 23-24 December 1944 the action of the 112th Regimental Combat Team was especially notable. Being ordered by higher headquarters to act as a covering force for units withdrawing to American lines it held its position under furious enemy infantry and tank attacks until the Regimental Headquarters and 1st Battalion, 112th Infantry were surrounded. The 1st Battalion then fought its way clear to friendly lines bringing with it a number of vehicles and personnel of other units. The gallantry under extremely hazardous and physically trying condition, the stubborn defense of the sectors assigned them, and heroic conduct of all personnel of the 112th Infantry Regimental Combat Team, in 9 days of continuous fighting, exemplify the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States.'

Along with the Battle Honors citation, Esko received the Army Presidential Unit Citation Ribbon for extraordinary heroism in action

against an armed enemy occurring on or after December 7, 1941. He was subsequently awarded The Silver Star Medal, the United States' third-highest award exclusively for combat valor.

Esko J. Koskinen, born in Rauma, Finland, immigrated to America in 1924. He was drafted into the service right after graduating from Teaneck High School in 1942. He was not yet a citizen at the time of entering the service. He, along with several hundred others, were sworn in as citizens on a field in England just before the invasion on D-Day.

Returning to San Francisco in December of 1945 LT. JG Schweizer and Bernice were married. He completed credits for his Engineering Degree at Newark College of Engineering, at night in 1950 and received his degree from the USMMA in 1950. Before retiring to Punta Gorda Isles FL they lived in Upper Saddle River NJ and summered at Lake Wallenpaupack PA with their sons. He and Bernice led a full life with travel to all parts of the globe covering five continents and every state in the US and all but one province of Canada. They were members of the Punta Boat Club and the Charlotte Harbor Yacht Club for many years and enjoyed sailing the wonderful waters around Florida. Jack was a member of the Saddle River Reformed Church in Upper Saddle River, NJ and a former member of their Consistory.

Wilber Granville Sherwood Technician 4th Grade Army 1916-1996
Gilbert Henry Simpson Army Air Forces 2012

Gilbert H Simpson, was a fighter pilot in the 318th Fighter Squadron 325 Fight Group, in the Mediterranean Theater of the Army Air Corps. He flew the legendary P-51 Mustang. The 318 Fighter Squadron was nicknamed "The Checkertail Clan" due to their Mustangs' yellow and black checkered tail.

Gil Simpson completed 500 flying hours and completed 60 hours of flying in the European Theater of operations. He was awarded the European Theatre Ribbon with 2 battle stars; the American Theatre Ribbon and Victory Ribbon. He also received a letter of gratitude from President Harry Truman, recognizing that he undertook the most severe task one can be called upon to perform. As stated in President Trumans' letter, Mr. Simpson demonstrated the fortitude, resourcefulness and calm judgement necessary to carry out the task in helping to defeat the enemy.

Raymond Snyder Gunner's Mate 3rd Class Petty Officer Navy 1925-1950

Raymond Snyder was one of 44 men from Upper Saddle River who joined the Armed Forces during World War II. He served in the U.S. Navy as a Gunners Mate, third class and was honorably discharged on October 3, 1945.

Born on Upper Saddle River Road in 1925, Raymond was the youngest child of Adrian Snyder Sr. (B 1885 - D 1947) and Jessie Bell Snyder (B 1889 - D 1953). After being discharged from the Navy, he lived with his sister in Montvale, NJ where he died in 1950 at age 24.

Joseph S. Strangio Marine Corps 1928-2021

Joe was born November 28, 1928, in Jersey City, New Jersey to Helen and Andrew Strangio. He enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in 1950 and proudly served his country during the Korean War. He received his degree in Industrial Engineering from Fairleigh Dickinson University after he was honorably discharged from the Marine Corps and while he was working for the Continental Can Company. His work career spanned from 1947 to 1998 and took him all over the world. He retired three times, Continental Group, 4M Manufacturing and finally from the Nestle Group. He was truly a self-made man. He married his high school sweetheart Carmela Bucci in July of 1952 and they raised two children.

Frank served in the U.S. Navy during the WWII on the USS Cadmus. He was the owner of the River Vale Dry Cleaners, the first dry cleaners in River Vale. He was a charter member of the River Vale Ambulance Corps, a member of the River Vale Lions Club and the Westwood Elks. He was also a lifelong parishioner of River Vale Community Evangelical Free Church. His wife is Ella K. Thoms of Park Ridge, NJ and they have four daughters.

Howard "Howie" M. Tiedemann Navy World War II & Korean War 2021

Howard enlisted in the United States Navy for World War II in 1942 and was assigned to the U.S.S. Donnell, a Destroyer Escort for convoy duty in the North Atlantic. The ship in route to the Normandy Invasion got torpedoed on May 3, 1944, losing 30 men and injuring 29. The ship then floated adrift at sea, open to enemy attack for three days. After World War II, Howie continued to serve in his community, and joined the Cresskill Volunteer Fire Department in 1949. In August of 1950, he was recalled to active duty by the United States Navy for the Korean War, which he accepted on the U.S.S. Shannon. Howie received ribbons for the many campaigns he fought in and also received the Distinguished Service Medal from the State of New Jersey for serving his country for more than eight years. In 1951, he returned to Cresskill. Howard married Virginia M. Bruntz, whose family roots in Cresskill go back to 1917. Howard and Virginia raised two children and have two grandchildren. Howie has always been committed to serving his country through his military service and in his community. He was a member of the Cresskill Volunteer Fire Department for over 70 years; a Life Member of the NY/NJ Fire Assoc.; member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, the Tin Can Sailors Association, and the Destroyer Escort Association. In 1999, the Bergen County Executive, William Pat Schumer, declared April
